How Do I Participate As A Driving Trail Site?

Complete an Allen County Quilt Trail Site Application, available at the Allen County Cooperative Extension Service or online at <http://ces.ca.uky.edu/allen>. The county committee will work with you in selecting a specific quilt pattern, site and story that will reflect your family history, rural heritage or natural inviting aspect unique to your location along the selected routes.

What Is An Allen County Quilt Trail?

Modeled after the Adams County, Ohio “Clothesline of Quilts”, the Kentucky Quilt Trail project encourages visitors to travel scenic or historic Kentucky highways in search of unique ‘painted’ quilt square signs on highly visible structures throughout the countryside and small towns. Each quilt square and its location are chosen by individuals, families, businesses or other groups to highlight unique family stories and the rich cultural heritage of Kentucky’s small towns and rural communities.

Where Are The Trails Located?

The Allen County Quilt Trail committee is seeking to develop specific driving trails, with quilt squares on highly visible structures, in the southern, eastern, northern and western parts of the county. Specific highways targeted include: U.S. 31-E North and South, Hwy 100 East and West, U.S. 231, Hwy 101 North and South, Hwy 98, Hwy 1533, Hwy 234, Hwy 252, Hwy 1421, and other connecting roads. Trail Brochures, as well as website maps, will highlight driving trail routes and showcase the heartwarming stories and histories behind each Quilt Square and site display location.



How Do I Participate As A Driving Trail Site?

Your pattern selection could reflect something special or unique about your family, your community or site location or just be a favorite pattern you enjoy! Patterns should be simple and use geometric shapes such as squares, rectangles, triangles or circles, with limited details for best visibility. Color combinations should be limited to four or less for the best visibility as well. Pattern references are available in Scottsville at the Cooperative Extension Service, the Allen County Library, Reflections hair & Nail Salon, NJ Creations or Sew Find Fabrics for suggestions.
