The 4-H Kindred Hearts Club toured the Meldahl Dam on the Ohio River on Friday, May 14th. The club received an excellent tour by Head Lockmaster Joe Hannah. We saw how the boats are put through the lock as well as how the dam operates. We also learned of the economic importance to the area through the commerce that passes up and down the river. It takes 15 barges of coal to fuel the Zimmer Electric Power Plant for one day. The average tow with 15 barges is hauling about 22,500 tons which is equal to 870 semi trucks!

Today in my fourth grade science class, I learned that fertilizer is used to help plants grow and that farmers put pesticides on crops so insects will not eat the crops. Mr. Prim took out a little city replica, and used drink mixes as things you put on your farm or lawn such as herbicide, pesticide, and fertilizer. I learned certain areas need fertilizer in order to help trees and other crops grow.

The water washed the things down into the river. After he pulled the drain we figured out that if you put plants by the river ways, the roots grab on to the soil and soak up the chemicals.
